These exercises will help homeschoolers learn how to calculate the rate of return on investments and illustrate how interest can accrue over time. If students are struggling, explain that calculating this answer involves only simple subtraction, where you subtract the initial investment of \$630 from the ending balance of \$1,083.60. Students would set up the problem as follows: \$1,083.60 - \$630 = \$453.60 Explain that some of the information in the question was extraneous and not necessary to solve the problem. For this problem, you don't need to know the years of the loan (eight years) or even the interest rate; you only need to know the beginning and ending balance. D.
